Commemorating Black Catholic History Month in the United States Meet the Black Catholics on the Road To Sainthood

During this month of November, we introduced the six black Catholics from the United States whose causes are under formal consideration for canonization in the Catholic Church. We provided a quick synopsis on their lives but encourage you to visit their websites to learn more about their lives of holiness and dedication to the Catholic church amidst racism and many other challenges. This week we explore the lives of the final three of the candidates.



Venerable Pierre Toussaint was born in Haiti in 1766 as a slave to the Berard family. He was trained as a house slave and was taught to read and write by his grandmother. As slaves and free people of color began to rise in rebellion in Haiti, the Berard family fled to New York taking Pierre with them. Upon arrival in New York, Pierre apprenticed as a hairdresser. After Jean Berard died, Pierre stayed on with the widow. Before the widow died in 1807, she freed Pierre. Four years later, he married Marie Rose Juliette, whose freedom he had purchased since he became financially successful. They later adopted Euphémie, his orphaned niece. Within the Catholic community, Toussaint was an exceptionally devout and charitable person. Every day he attended the 6:00am Mass in St. Peter's Church, where he was a pewholder for many years. He


raised funds to build the original St. Patrick's Cathedral and St. Vincent de Paul Church. Pierre donated to various charities, generously assisting blacks and whites in need. They opened their home to orphans and educated them. The couple also nursed abandoned people who were suffering from yellow fever. Urged to retire and enjoy the wealth he had accumulated, Pierre responded, "I have enough for myself, but if I stop working I have not enough for others." Servant of the Lord Thea Bowman was born in Yazoo City, MS in 1937. While her grandfather was a slave, her parents had successful careers—her father a doctor, and her mother a teacher. With their permission, Thea converted to Catholicism when she was 9-years-old, and later joined the Franciscan Sisters of Perpetual Adoration in Wisconsin as the only African-American member. Her education was extensive. She earned a B.A. in English before attending the Catholic University of America in D.C., earning a M.A. and Ph.D., both in English. Following graduation, she taught at schools all over the U.S. for 16 years. She then moved to Jackson, MS, where she served as the diocesan consultant for intercultural

awareness. Thea used her dynamic mind, voice and personality to give presentations across the country. Her goal was to break down racial and cultural barriers, and she encouraged others to communicate and understand one another. Thea played a tremendous role in publishing the Catholic hymnal, Lead Me, Guide Me: The African







Servant of the Lord Julia Greely was born into slavery in Missouri. When she was only 5-years-old, her eye was permanently injured by a slave master's whip that he was using on her mother. She was freed under the Emancipation Proclamation in 1865. She took employment as a cook and nanny to Julia Pratte Dickerson of St. Louis. She moved with Julia and her husband, William, to Denver, CO. Julia was baptized Catholic in 1880, and thereafter received the Eucharist daily. She was known for her devotion to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, the Blessed Virgin Mary and the Eucharist. Her faith was so strong that she walked the streets distributing information from the Sacred Heart League, all while quietly suffering from painful

arthritis. According to Julia's obituary: "Every door in the parish was open to her. Her marvelous piety and her constant charity made her the friend of everybody. She was known in every convent of Denver, for, as might be expected, she loved the Sisters." She was perhaps best known for her "little red wagon," which she pulled through the

streets of Denver at night, distributing food, coal and clothing to needy families. Julia did her charitable works under the cover of darkness so she wouldn't embarrass those accepting charity from a poor, black woman. In 1901, Greeley joined the Secular Franciscans. In recognition of her dedication to the poor, Greeley has been dubbed "Denver's Angel of Charity.". To learn more: https://juliagreeley.org or scan QR code.



JESUS CHRIST, KING OF THE UNIVERSE

On this Solemnity of Christ, King of the Universe, we are presented with three portraits of our King. First He is the CARING KING. The first reading has God say, I myself will look after and tend my sheep, as a shepherd tends his flock when he finds himself

among his scattered sheep, I will rescue them from every place where they were scattered when it was cloudy and dark. Thus, the Lord cares for us and seeks us when we stray, calls to us and seeks to draw us back. He is a caring King. The Second reading depicts Jesus as the COSMIC KING. He is king of all things, not just us. We are told that every satanic enemy of his will be put under his feet even death itself and that all things will be subject to him. For now this does not always appear so, but in the end, Jesus' complete sovereignty over the whole cosmos will be evident to all. He is the cosmic King. Lastly, he is presented in the Gospel as the COMING KING. For he shall come upon the clouds and take his judgment seat and all will be brought before him. Here we see a lot of paradox, for our King, Jesus, is depicted as a King who was hungry, thirsty, imprisoned, ill, naked and a stranger, for he identifies with all and to serve or neglect them, is to serve or neglect Him. Remember this, if you have loved the poor and the needy, God will never forget what you have done. The poor may not be able to reward you, but Jesus who is in them, will pay you back a million times over. He is the coming King and has the power to do so. To serve this King is to serve and love his poor and needy children.

The Three Comings of Christ

The season of Advent begins the Church's liturgical year and encompasses the four Sundays (and weekdays) leading up to the celebration of Christmas or the Nativity of Our Lord. The term "Advent" means a coming or arrival. As we begin this Advent season during the 'Year of the Eucharist', we will focus on how Christ comes to us. A focus on his first coming at the incarnation seems obvious to us, with Christmas so near. But there is also a focus, especially in early Advent, on the Second Coming of Christ at the end of the world. However, between the first and second coming of Christ there is a "middle" or kind of "third" coming that flows from his first coming and prepares us for his second coming. This middle or "third coming" is his on-going presence with us in the Holy Eucharist.

We have the Eucharist because of his first coming to us in the flesh. The Eucharist also prepares us for Jesus' second coming by being a source of holiness for us and food for our journey. Let's consider these "three comings" of Christ and realize the treasure of it all!

We pray this family day will help you and your family to embrace the Season of Advent and truly appreciate how it brings us closer to the Lord especially in the Holy Eucharist. Come and hear how you can have a blessed and holy Advent season.







The Mass in Slow Motion






The Gloria

This is a series on the Mass explaining the meaning and history of what we do each Sunday. This series of flyers is an attempt to add insight and understanding to our celebration of the Sacred Liturgy. You are also invited to learn more by attending Sunday School classes for adults which take place in the school cafeteria each Sunday from 9:45 am. to 10:45 am.

This series will follow the Mass in order.

We have gathered and acknowledged God's presence in several ways — hymn of praise, incense, veneration of the altar, and the greeting of the celebrant. We have examined our consciences and asked God to give us pure hearts and minds to praise him. At most Sunday Masses what comes next is a kind of outburst of praise called the Gloria — "Glory to God in the highest!" or in Latin, "Gloria in excelsis Deo!" Knowing and experiencing God's presence and mercy brings forth joy and a desire to praise him. And so, we sing:



Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will. We praise you; we bless you, we adore you, we glorify you, we give you thanks for your great glory, Lord God, heavenly King, O God, almighty Father. Lord Jesus Christ, Only Begotten Son, Lord God, Lamb of God, Son of the Father, you take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us; you take away the sins of the world, receive our prayer; you are seated at the right hand of the Father, have mercy on us. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

The Gloria is a very old and venerable hymn of the Church. It is sung by the congregation, or by the congregation alternately with the choir. If it is not sung it is to be recited by all in unison or alternately. It is sung on Sundays outside the Advent and Lenten seasons, as well as on solemnities and feasts and at special, more solemn celebrations. The text of the Gloria echoes the song of the angels at the Nativity. Further, it praises and invokes both the Father and Son and concludes with a brief doxology to the Trinity.

History - The Gloria was not created originally for the Mass. It is an heirloom from the treasure of ancient church hymns. Indeed, it is a precious remnant of a literature now mostly lost but once certainly very rich. These hymns imitated and borrowed from biblical themes. They may even be said to take after the tradition established by Mary who proclaimed her *Magnificat* (My soul proclaims the greatness of God...) by borrowing heavily from the biblical themes. So too, Zechariah in his *Benedictus* (Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel. He has come to his people and set them free...). Both of these hymn-like praises are found in the Gospel of Luke in the first chapter. Few of the other early hymns of the Church remain, however. One other hymn which does remain is the *Te Deum*, (We praise you Oh God and acknowledge you to be Lord...). It too is a hymn of thanksgiving and praise to God. Unlike the Gloria, it has retained its existence apart from the Mass.



The roots of the Gloria may be found as early as the 4th Century where a text very close to our present text is found. Likewise, another text from the 7th Century is also very close. Again, this hymn was not originally part of the Mass but was probably sung as the *Te Deum* is today in celebrating liturgical feasts. It was sometimes included in the Mass as a hymn as early as the 6th Century and perhaps even earlier by some accounts. But definitely by the 6th Century Pope Symmachus permitted its use on Sundays and feasts of martyrs but only at a Mass presided over by a Bishop. Pope Gregory allowed its use at the Easter Mass even if the Celebrant was only a priest. It was not until the 11th Century that the distinction allowing it only for Bishop's Masses was dropped. This was due to continual requests that it be allowed. Today, the Gloria is said at all Masses of a festive character outside of penitential seasons.

A full analysis of the hymn could be a course in itself. However, suffice it to say that it is understood to be a hymn of praise which is almost ecstatic in quality. So, it is fitting that the Gloria be sung if possible. Reciting the Gloria comes in at a very poor second. It is a bit like reciting the National Anthem. We just don't do this because the very festivity and honor of the song requires it be sung. The Gloria is like this, if at all possible, it should therefore be sung. However, this is not always possible and it ends up being recited. It should at least be recited in a vibrant and pious manner to avoid the possibility of the text becoming wooden and dull.

In the end, these introductory rites of procession, penance and praise all serve to establish the fact that we are in the presence of God. Casting aside our sin and sorrow, we enter God's presence with reverence, confidence and joy. Next, as we shall study, we will listen attentively to God speak to us.

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




