

FIRST SUNDAY IN LENT

Readings This Weekend:

Genesis 9:8-15 1 Peter 3:18-22 Mark 1:12-15

Readings Next Weekend:

Genesis 22:1-2, 9a, 10-13, 15-18 Romans 8:31b-34 Mark 9:2-10



The second reading today speaks to us of the gifts and images of our baptism and the new life given to us through the death of Christ. First, note the PURPOSE of our baptism. The text tells us that Christ died for us that "he might lead you to God. Yes, indeed, for we have all gone astray like

sheep" (Is 53:6). Once we walked with God in the garden in love and familiarity. But then we sinned and became alienated from God and dead in our sins. Christ, like a Good Shepherd, gathers us and leads us back to God. Next, notice the **PATTERN** of our baptism. We are given the image of Noah's ark. Text says that they were saved through water. Further, it is a combination of wood and water. The ark, made of gopher wood, helps them to benefit from the saving waters by not being overwhelmed by them. It is the same for us who are saved through the waters of baptism. But those waters are given power by the wood of the cross. Finally, note the PURIFICATION of our baptism. In Jesus we have been given a clear conscience since we have risen to a whole new life. Note that Jesus offers us an entirely new and different life. This life is increasingly victorious over sin and receptive of new graces and virtues. Because of this our conscience becomes clear and we, with Christ, ascend to the heavens. The text is clear to emphasize: new life, ascension to heaven, and authority and power (over sin and death). All of these things Christ died to give us.

Holy Comforter—Saint Cyprian Parish's Celebration of Black Catholic History Month 2024

Black History is Everyone's History—A Shared American Story

The parish known as Holy Comforter-Saint Cyprian can trace its beginnings to two distinct churches—St. Cyprian, established in 1893, and Holy Comforter established in 1904. This is a brief history of St. Cyprian's parish. After the Civil War, there were large movements of African-Americans from the south into cities, especially to the north, and many came to Washington, DC. Some settled in the Capitol Hill neighborhood. These Black Catholics began to attend St. Peter's

Church at Second & C Streets, SE, and it is here that this story begins. Throughout the latter half of the 19th Century, St. Peter's parish continued to grow and prosper, yet the African-Americans who worshipped there were never fully accepted as members of the church community. They were made to sit in the back of the church, use different doors from the white church members, and eventually excluded from the main sanctuary and forbidden to be married or baptized at the main altar. Though there was precedent for African-Americans to break away and form their own churches, the blacks at St. Peter's became frustrated when they were unable to establish their own church because there were so few black priests in the United States. In 1887, Fr. James R. Matthews (who was not African-American) came to St. Peter's as assistant pastor and began to work diligently with the African-American Catholics to create their own parish where they would feel welcomed. Before eventually being transferred, he convinced Fr. J. M. O'Brien to write the Archdiocese of the Catholic Diocese in Baltimore asking to establish St. Cyprian parish. In 1892, Cardinal Gibbons agreed that the time for such a move was right and he had Fr. Matthews transferred back to Capitol Hill.

At the same time, Miss Mary Atkins offered a plot of land at 8th Street to Fr. Matthews to be used for a school for African-American children. Fr. Matthews invited the Oblate Sisters of Providence to take charge of the school that was established. By 1894 a larger school building was erected at 310—8th Street and named St. Ann's Academy. (In 1964, the school eventually merged with Holy Comforter School, the process went very smoothly.)



Saint Cyprian Parish

On March 12, 1893, the group of African-Americans who had been meeting in St. Peter's hall were officially organized as St. Cyprian Parish and recognized by the Archdiocese of Baltimore. By April 18, 1893, a tract of land at 13th & C Streets, SE, was purchased for the sum of \$12,480 with funds raised through donations by parishioners, and loans from the Cardinal, as well as from societies who assist the Black community. The Church and rectory were built on this land. Ground was broken on July 1, 1893, and the cornerstone was laid on September 24, 1893. A ceremony to celebrate the laying of the cornerstone of the new church included a parade witnessed by more than 10,000 people. Cardinal Gibbons marched with the parishioners to the site and spoke at the dedication. The pioneering members of St. Peter's Church, who had the courage and vision to establish the parish of St. Cyprian, were rewarded for their dedication when St. Cyprian's opened the door to its new Church building on June 2, 1894, just eight months after the laying of the cornerstone.

St. Cyprian became a thriving force in the community. During the church's first year, there were 1500 members, with 250 children attending Sunday School. That same year over 200 people were baptized. St. Cyprian became the only Catholic parish in the country to provide its members with an adult night school.

During those early years, the parish was blessed by the efforts of many dedicated parishioners who worked closely with the founding Pastor, Father (later Monsignor) James Matthews who served the parish from 1893-1934. In 1943, St. Cyprian was transferred to the Josephites (organized in 1893 as an American missionary group devoted to evangelizing African-Americans). Throughout the years, St. Cyprian continued to be the focal point of the Capitol Hill African-American community. In 1966, however, this pivotal force faced a serious challenge when its magnificent buildings needed extensive repairs that proved too expensive to undertake. Fr. Burke, the pastor at the time of the closing, explained that over \$350,000 was needed to repair the buildings and he approached Cardinal O'Boyle and suggested a possible merger with Holy Comforter since this parish had suffered a serious decline in membership. After much deliberation, Cardinal O'Boyle, with reservation, agreed to merge the parishes. Yet it must be said that things did not go smoothly and many parishioners today still express concern over the way the whole matter was handled. The announcement of the closing came suddenly on a

Sunday in late August 1966. The parishioners were told that within two weeks their parish buildings would be closed. With two weeks notice, no one had time to raise funds so they had to move to the Holy Comforter Parish building. The St. Cyprian Parish buildings stood empty for five years until 1971 when they were demolished. A plaque commemorating the site of St. Cyprian is located at that site today. In 1966, the blended parish of Holy Comforter-St. Cyprian was formed and run by the Josephites. In 1984, the parish was returned to the care of diocesan priests and continues to serve the community. The merged school unfortunately closed in 2007. The Preface Dialogue

e Mass explaining the meaning and history of what we do each Sunday. This series of flyers is insignt and understanding to our celebration of the Sacred Liturgy. You are also invited to learn more by attending Summay Summay for adults which take place in the school cafeteria each Sunday from 9:45 am. to 10:45 am.

This series will follow the Mass in order.



A short dialogue happens in the Mass just after the prayer over the gifts and before the singing of the Sanctus (Holy, Holy, Holy). It is called the "preface dialogue" and it is really quite remarkable in its sweeping vision and heavenly call. Part of the reason we miss its significance is that the translation of the Latin is difficult to accomplish in English. Allow me to give the current translation so you'll recognize it and then render a more literal version of the Latin.

- ❖ The Lord be with you.
- ❖ And with your spirit.
- **\Lift** up your hearts.
- ❖ We lift them up to the Lord.
- ❖ Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.
- ❖ It is right and just.

A fairly familiar dialogue to be sure. But to some extent it fails to take wing because of the rather earthbound notion most moderns have of the Mass. Very few attending Mass today think much of the heavenly liturgy. Rather they are focused on their parish Church, the priest in front of them and the people around them. But this is NOT an adequate vision for the Mass. In the end there is only one liturgy, the one in heaven. There is only one altar, the one in heaven. There is only one High Priest, Jesus in heaven. In the Mass we are swept up into the heavenly liturgy. There with myriads of angels and saints beyond number we worship the Father through Jesus, with Jesus, and in Jesus. In the Mass we are swept into heaven!

With this in mind consider a more literal rendering of the preface dialogue. Pay attention especially to the middle dialogue:

- ❖ Dominus Vobiscum (The Lord be with you)
- et cum spiritu tuo (And with your Spirit)
- Sursum corda (Hearts aloft!)
- ♦ habemus ad Dominum (We have, to the Lord!)
- ❖ Gratias agamus, Dominio Deo nostro (Let us give thanks to the Lord our God)
- Dignum et justum est (It is right and just.)

What is the celebrant really inviting us to do? After greeting us in the Lord, he invites us to go to heaven! But remember the priest is *in persona Christi* (he is praying in the person of Christ). Hence, when he speaks it is really the Lord Jesus who speaks, making use of the voice of the priest. And what does the Lord really say to us in the magnificent dialogue and preface that follows? Allow me to elaborate on the fuller meaning of this text:



"Let your hearts be taken up! Come and go with me to the altar that is in heaven where I, Jesus the great High Priest, with all the members of my body render perfect thanks to God the Father! You are no longer on earth; your hearts have been swept aloft into the great liturgy of heaven! Come up higher. By the power of my words, you are able to come up higher! Since you have been raised to new life in Christ, seek the things that are above where I am at my Father's right hand. Come up now and enter the heavenly liturgy. Hearts aloft!"

The congregation's response is meant to be a joyful acknowledgment and acceptance of the Lord's action in summoning us to the heavenly liturgy. Here, too, allow me to elaborate:



"We have our hearts lifted to the Lord. We have entered the Heavenly Liturgy by the power of your grace, for you, our Head, have taken us, the members of your body, there. We are in the heavenly realms with you, worshipping the Father and giving him perfect thanks and praise. It is right and just that we should do this through you, with you and in you, joining all the angels and saints!

Then, the celebrant sings or says the preface wherein some specific things for which we are thankful are enumerated. The text of the preface changes based on the season or the saint or feast of the day. But it always ends in this or a similar manner: And so, with angels and archangels and the whole company of heaven we sing the unending hymn of your praise as we acclaim: Holy, Holy, Holy.... And thus, we are reminded that our worship is caught up into the heavenly liturgy where our voices join innumerable angels and saints in the glorious act of praise. We are in heaven! Our hearts (our very selves) are aloft!

Hence, the Mass is never just the "11:00 a.m. Mass at Saint Cyprian." It is the heavenly liturgy. Until recently Churches were designed to remind us that we were entering heaven. As we walk into older churches we are surrounded by windows and paintings that depict the angels and saints. Christ is at the center in the tabernacle. And all the elements that scripture speaks of as in the heavenly liturgy are on display not only in the building but in the celebration of the liturgy: candles, incense, an altar, the hymns that are sung, the Holy, Holy, Holy, the scroll is brought forward in the Book of Gospels, the lamb on the throne-like altar, the prostrations and kneeling of the saints before the Lord. All these things are described in the Book of Revelation, descriptions of the heavenly liturgy. None of these things are in our churches or the liturgy for arbitrary reasons. We are in the heavenly realms and the heavenly liturgy and so we see and experience heavenly things.

Hearts aloft!
